

FROM THE VICAR

Last month I reflected on the fact that we're living in 'extraordinary times', in contrast to the official 'Ordinary Time' of the church's calendar describing the weeks before Lent. However common in previous ages, the current growing gap between rich and poor in this country and elsewhere is unusual in our own lifetimes, and is something to be regretted and resisted by Christians and others of good will.

Equally challenging is the growing polarity of opinion in society, visible in political and, sometimes, church life. Assumptions are being challenged, often uncomfortably. The election of Donald Trump and, rather differently, our own Referendum result have revealed a wide divide of opinion and outlook that was previously not so visible. This is perhaps no bad thing, in that our previous consensus was masking the fact that how things are may suit some people very comfortably ... while others invisibly pay the price.

In the church, disagreements often seem focussed on sexuality. Last month's General Synod (our church's national 'parliament') rejected a unanimous report by the Bishops restating the church's traditional view on marriage as a lifelong partnership between a man and a woman. There is a growing unease that simply restating old definitions doesn't do justice to the human realities (nor have anything to offer those involved) where marriage is very often now neither lifelong nor heterosexual.

Locally here in CHEQS we're spared the need to pronounce in general terms on such controversial issues – and here as in every parish our task is to respond with God's loving acceptance to people in whatever state they find themselves. Spare a prayer for the Bishops, who find themselves "damned if they do and damned if they don't" whenever they open their mouths on almost any subject – the price of trying to give a lead, or to foster unity, in an age when there is very little consensus on a whole range of social and moral issues.

If we follow the example of Jesus, we'll be hugely welcoming to a bewildering array of flawed people (*ie* people like ourselves) – and we'll strive constantly ourselves to be wholehearted in our own pursuit of loving holiness. Lent is a traditional time for having a good hard look at ourselves in the light of Jesus' example, and in this magazine you'll find details of some of our Lenten teaching, worship and other activities to help you do this.

BELL-RINGING ON APRIL 1ST

The bells at both Coln St Aldwyns and Hatherop are part of the Cirencester Branch of the Gloucester & Bristol Diocesan Association of Church Bell Ringers.

There are twelve branches within the association, and each year one the branches hosts the Annual General Meeting. This year Cirencester branch is hosting the AGM at Chedworth on Saturday 1 April 2017.

All ringers aspire to ring well, and part of this involves striking bells evenly. As a result, on the day of the AGM two striking-competitions are held – one on six bells and the other on eight. This year Coln St Aldwyns ringers have been asked to host the eight-bell completion.

Each team (one from each branch) is given three minutes to practise on the bells, and then ring their competition piece. Judges will be positioned so they can clearly hear the bells and will mark the quality of the ringing.

Each eight-bell team will be selected from the best ringers within the branches, so the quality of the ringing will be of a high standard.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT FOR THE CHEQS PARISHES

As with all our churches, Southrop PCC (the Church Council) is responsible for overseeing the raising of money for the church and its ministry. One of the Council members reminds us of one of our best tools for this – the Parish Giving Scheme.

The battle to fund and maintain our parishes and beloved places of worship continues and a critical element of this is through planned regular donation by those of us who are so fortunate to live in such a special community. Many of you may not be aware of this cornerstone of parish finance. However, approximately 75% of the cost of providing and maintaining these services is met by personal donation.

The Parish Giving Scheme is run by the Diocese of Gloucester and provides a simple mechanism for parishioners to donate regularly to their local parish by way of an index-linked direct debit for regular giving, however large or small. Every donation helps. Through this scheme, Gift Aid (the reclaim of tax from the government on your donation) is automatically included, helping to maximise the benefit of every donation. Further details will be circulated shortly around our parish. If you do not already donate to your local parish then please consider this simple and effective scheme which will help maintain these essential services and our beautiful local churches.

In all the time I was meeting people in the resort, I was constantly aware of being supported back home by the prayers of faithful Christian friends, especially those in CHEQS. For, despite my familiarity with the winter ski-scene, and despite being well known in Wengen, I still find the ministry of being chaplain of an Alpine church very challenging. This should not perhaps be surprising – after all, it is a mission!

FROM HOLLAND TO THE COTSWOLDS

Our villages are full of people with interesting life-stories ... and we hope from time to time in this magazine to introduce you to some of them. This month Jane Kidd writes about Lucile Webb-Peploe.

The greatest influence on Lucile's life, she believes, was before she was born. The daughter of a German countess and a Dutch baron, her navy father was a young ADC to the Admiral of the Allied Far East Fleet based in Indonesia. In February 1942 the fleet was about to face an overwhelming Japanese naval invasion force, and he knew that he was unlikely to return. So he sat down with his family, read three psalms with them and then prayed for each one including his unborn baby (Lucile). In the Java Sea battle which followed, virtually all the Allied ships were sunk with the loss of 2,300 sailors.



“God has undoubtedly answered my parents’ prayers” says Lucile. “My whole life has been full of miracles, experiencing his hand on me and my circumstances because of the prayers before and since I was born”. It was this that has kept her going through many dangers and difficulties in what has at times been an adventurous existence.

After the Japanese invasion her 27-year old mother, two-year old sister and she herself as a baby were initially placed under house arrest, but before long were herded onto cattle trains and sent to a series of concentration camps, where children were often left alone without food or water and were sometimes beaten, while the women were forced to work on the tea plantations. Emaciated as they became, all three of them were still alive when the war ended after four years of imprisonment.

They returned to the grandparents in Holland and grew up in the family home. Having no father, while her cousins all had theirs, Lucile sometimes gave way to angry outbursts against the Japanese, hating them for their cruelty. Her mother, who never showed any bitterness over the loss of three brothers, a sister and her own husband, would take her on her lap and explain that it was alright to be sad, but never to hate or be angry. Lucile says “It saved our family”.

It also helped her through her adult life which took her to countries all around the world – including Japan. Forty-nine years ago she married Hanmer, a Shell International executive; and they lived for several years in seven different postings, including three States in the USA, England, Holland, Thailand and Hong

Kong. Their three boys certainly had a stimulating upbringing, but again their very existence was a miracle. After many complications, doctors in the USA had told Lucile that she could not have children. A faith-filled Christian friend prayed for her one evening, and everything changed. Lucile says “Prayer works”.

After a life of constant moves, Lucile and Hanmer found a home here in CHEQS, where they became great contributors, helping to start *Alpha*, Marriage Courses, events at the ‘Gate on the Green’, and other church, music and community activities.

Lucile has long had another passion, and that is for horses. She has ridden for much of her life and is now the chief instructor at Talland’s weekly sessions for Riding for the Disabled.

There is not enough space to tell of more of these miraculous events. Some would call them coincidences. But Lucile believes they are ‘God-incidences’ – God answering the prayers of her parents and others.
