

FROM THE VICAR

As most of our readers will know, Coln church is one of only two in this country to be dedicated to the Decollation (*ie* the beheading) of John the Baptist. But did you know another rare feature that it has – the palindromic inscription at the base of the font?

It reads *nipson anomēmata mē monan opsin* – a Greek phrase which reads the same backwards as forwards. Palindromes have been popular since the sixth day of Creation, when the first human introduced himself to the second: “Madam, I’m Adam!” but the one in Coln has a distinguished history, being a copy of that in the church of Hagia Sophia in Constantinople.

The phrase means “Wash my sins, not only my face” – a reference to the sacrament of Baptism – and is found in only a handful of churches in England. While our services are usually, rightly, times of celebration as we gather to worship God, there is also an element of reflectiveness – an awareness that we are not the people that we would like to be that we fall short of God’s intentions for us, and indeed of our hopes for ourselves. Our sins need washing.

Lent is traditionally the time of the year when Christians reflect most on their need for forgiveness and renewal; and we invite you to join us in doing so. Ash Wednesday (14th) marks the start of Lent, and there are special services in Fairford at 12 noon and in Lechlade at 7.30 pm. Extra groups for reflection and prayer are taking place – see page 2, or the various church website(s) for details. And we’re again holding Lent lunches – see page 11.

Jesus taught time and again that God forgives and welcomes even the most disreputable people, and he showed that by how himself related to different sorts of people. It’s not moral weakness, our failures and shortcomings, that keep us from God but our lack of desire to be different.

Lent is an excellent time for revisiting our New Year’s resolutions – or perhaps going beyond that, by building into our lives more reflectiveness and readiness to change, or be changed, as we open ourselves more fully to God. We hope you find our churches helpful in providing space for you to do that. Why not take advantage of what we offer this month and next?

HATHEROP CASTLE SCHOOL

As a general rule, Winter is my favourite season but February can always plant a seed of doubt in my mind. The wonder of Christmas and the excitement and promise of new beginnings in January are a distant memory and Spring is not yet quite in sight. In a school it is often the term for indoor playtimes and less opportunities to take learning outdoors and, of course, the school day still finishes in almost-darkness.

For the last few years I have completed the 100 Days of Happiness challenge which asks for 1 photo every day for 100 days of something, however big or small, that made you happy. If you feel so inclined, these can then be shared on social media or just kept for yourself. Of course, as Winter turns to Spring it is the time to look forward and we always have something to look forward to, the Prep 7 and 8s prepare for their exams and next schools, throwing in an end of year production and expeditions up Snowden and down the River Wye for some variety. Prep 6 prepare for their next steps be that with us or at their next schools, Middle School look forward to their production just before Easter, to school trips and the Prep 5 residential trip to Dorset. Pre Prep are embarking on an even more creative approach to their curriculum with practical activities, awe and wonder taking centre stage as their excitement and enthusiasm for learning is developed.

Perhaps February isn't so bad after all?!



COLN ST ALDWYNS – NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH SCHEME

New Year, New Neighbourhood Watch : Taking Personal Responsibility.

With a recent rise in crime through the Cotswolds it's time to fight back and take personal responsibility for our own village, property and neighbours through an active neighbourhood watch group.

Here are a few ideas that may help protect your own property and deter thieves from our outstanding village.

After meeting with our neighbourhood police team here are some ideas that may help:

1. Have you an active burglar alarm and do you use it?
2. Have you window locks and door mortice locks in place?
3. Are all out buildings under lock and key? -Sheds, Garages, and don't forget Oil supplies.
4. Are your car / van locked when parked up? Do you leave valuables on show inside?
5. Have you locked away any builder's materials and equipment that could be used to gain access to your property? – Ladders, Shovels, Tools, Electrical equipment.
6. Do you have automatic PIR outdoor lights in place? Do they work? Are they out of arms reach from floor level?
7. Do you use light automatic timers inside your home when you are out?
8. Do you pull your curtains at night? This could help stop potential burglar's looking into your home?
9. Do you leave expensive belongings visible through windows? – Laptops, Phones etc.
10. Are you friendly with your neighbour? Do you have their phone number? Could you call them for assistance DAY or Night?
11. When you go on holiday do you inform your neighbours? Do you change your habits? Do you park your car / van in a different place? This could highlight to burglars that your house is left unattended!

Remember: prevention of crime will always be better than a cure!
