Working in a school is a privilege and I feel we owe it to our pupils to always be reviewing our curriculum, teaching methods and the activities we offer.

As we embark on the start of the best term (my opinion) in the school year there is much to look forward to. Our Prep 5 to 8 children will all spend a week under canvas during the term in different locations from Dorset to Snowdon, as part of our Outdoor Learning Programme. Our Upper School will be rehearsing and performing their drama production in our theatre. Our sports teams will be playing cricket and rounders matches with swimming and athletics events squeezed into the sports programme. In June, we welcome all the Year 6 children from the Wishford School's family to Hatherop for a weekend of camping, STEAM events and fun. In addition to all this we keep the children working hard and our Prep 8's will be preparing and taking their Common Entrance exams to their Senior Schools in June. It will be a busy, but hugely rewarding term.

EASTLEACH ROGATION SUNDAY 24th JUNE

What better way to start the day than by coming to our village church and finishing up at village pub at opening time?

The word "Rogation" comes from the Latin verb *rogare* meaning "to ask", and every year on this Sunday we gather as a rural community to ask for God's blessing on our crops, our animals and our gardens, something which villages have been doing for very many years.

We start inside the church with a short, very informal service in which the words and cheerful hymns all have a rural theme. Then outside, where all the prayers are read by people who live in the village. First by the willow tree; then Keble Bridge to bless the water; next by a garden and finally outside The Vic where the prayer is followed by a rousing rendition of the harvest hymn "We Plough the Fields and Scatter" and a Blessing. Then inside the Vic!

We hope that you will join us in celebrating our life in this wonderful place – even if it's just for the last part! And please make a note of our very special Village Service on June 23rd which is followed by refreshments in the churchyard. More details in the June magazine.

SOUTHROP PRIMARY SCHOOL

Having successfully bid for £10,000 of lottery funding, there is now much excitement at the prospect of the forthcoming improvements to our playground. By the time you read this, new activity play equipment, consisting of a trim trail, climbing poles, a stage with chalkboards behind, a mini mud kitchen, den-making posts and an area of artificial grass, will be ready for use. We are very grateful to the PTA who have contributed some additional funds for the project. This will vastly extend the range of activities available to the children at break times and contribute to their physical fitness and wellbeing.

The school diary has been very busy since the beginning of the year. The nature quiz team won in the first round of the competition run by the Gloucestershire Wildlife Trust and now go through to the next round. The Juniors had the opportunity to develop their STEM skills (Science Technology Engineering Mathematics) with a Knex challenge and one pair are going forward to compete in the county final this month. Years 5 and 6 are also competing in the annual Mock Trial, with Southrop acting as the prosecution this year. This activity allows great opportunities to develop the children's speaking and listening skills and their powers of persuasive argument.

Despite the weather we have also been competing in sporting fixtures. The pupils enjoyed the netball tournament at Farmor's School and competed in the swimming gala. We were pleased with how many children chose to compete in the district cross country competitions. Special congratulations to Dexter in Year 5 who came first in both the district competitions, went through to the county finals and has now qualified for the National finals!

Finally, this term our school has been paid a visit by both the SIAMs inspector (Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools) and the OFSTED inspector. We are delighted to have been judged 'good' in both cases.

VISIT TO READING ABBEY

Thursday 28 June. Reading Abbey was established by Henry I in 1125 and he was buried there in 1136. The church was also intended as a pilgrimage church and was given a hand of St James (!) by the founder. However, it fell foul of Henry VIII and subsequently failed to survive the Civil War. Some of it is now under Reading gaol – forever linked with Oscar Wilde. The vast ruins still give a sense of magnificence and have now been consolidated. The interesting museum contains the only copy of the Bayeux Tapestry, made with great attention to detail in the 19th century. There are also important links with Quenington church. A minibus will be arranged and we have been given permission to park by the church of St James, Pugin's first essay in medieval architecture. He reset several of the remains of the Abbey in the building. Further details of this fascinating day out will follow next month.

TO ALL DOG OWNERS

“Cotswold District Council is receiving complaints regarding irresponsible dog owners allowing their dogs to foul in our villages. The Council can issue fixed penalty fines of £75 or proceed via the courts who can fine up to £1000 for this anti-social offence. Locals are angry, and pretty soon a name will be given to us and we are obliged to proceed against these people. The council will give anonymity to witnesses, and we always prosecute and inform the local press. Please keep dogs on leads in public places and always walk with dogs in front of you so you can see if they leave anything behind! Do not get caught, fined and embarrassed: be responsible.”

COLN VILLAGE FETE

The famous Coln St Aldwyns Children's Fete & Produce Show is now confirmed for Saturday 1 September, and once again, by kind permission of Earl St Aldwyn, will be held in the beautiful grounds of the Mill House, beginning with a BBQ lunch at 12.30 pm and running until 5.00 pm with children's games and entertainment, live music, stalls, afternoon teas, and a Pimm's bar. One exciting innovation is that the produce show is being renamed the CHEQS Produce Show to better reflect what it's always been, a showcase for the talents of people from the five villages. Once again, our twin aims are to make it a fabulous fun day out for families and to raise lots of money for local children's charities. Last year's fete raised a record £7,620 which we spent on interactive white boards for Hatherop Primary; sound and lighting equipment for Southrop Primary; music therapy for Paternoster School; some sessions for local children to learn about farming at Scrubditch Farm; two new quad bikes for Noah's Ark; Christmas family parties for our local Home Start and the James Hopkins Trust; £1,000 to Cirencester's Cotswold Counselling to fund one-to-one therapy sessions for children; and £750 to Coln Parish Council to renew the play surface under the climbing frame!
