I led the service in Coln, and was able during it to ‘interview’ a number of local residents who had chosen hymns, or were leading prayers or doing readings. Members of the village choir added to the celebration, and the service was widely appreciated.

As part of it, I said what could have been said in any of our villages – what good neighbourliness we enjoy – how much we appreciate not just the natural beauty but also the human kindness of our communities. In the words of one of the Bible writers, our “lines have fallen in pleasant places”.

I went on to say that in the church we regard ourselves not just as one society amongst others in the village, but as part of something more than that – sharing, in our generation, in an organization and using a building that speaks of something that underlies all our village activities – the life of the human spirit.

We take great pride in maintaining our lovely churches, and ensuring that they are open every day of the year as a resource for villagers and visitors (of whom we welcome very many). You don’t need to be a regular churchgoer, or even a Christian at all, to benefit from and to be welcome in our lovely buildings, during the quietness of a weekday as much as in the busyness of a Sunday.

So do use our church buildings – come and sit, and think or pray in them, and let the faith that built them touch your soul. We’re not just consumers, ungrateful materialists or hedonists – in the words of another Bible writer, God has “put eternity into people’s hearts”. The village church is *your* church, whether you come on a Sunday or not: so make good use of it!

Please remember to collect your seeds for the Seed Swap, to be held at Quenington Village Hall on Apple Day in October 20th. No money will be exchanged but packets need to be clearly marked with the name and collection date. You could also add any other useful growing tips. Unused seed packets can also be exchanged.

Some easy vegetables include beans, peas, tomatoes and spinach. Remember: no hybrids, dry seeds completely on the plants for most seeds, reduce cross-pollination by only growing one variety of each species and isolate by distance. Only save seeds from the healthiest 'true-to-type' plants.

On a professional level this time of year allows us to reflect on the myriad of achievements of our pupils and school community at Hatherop Castle School.

On a personal level it provides me with the opportunity to contemplate the experience of my first year as Headmaster at Hatherop Castle school.

A particular high point for me being the opportunity to get to know the children and parents of Hatherop Castle School and celebrate with them their successes and failures.

An odd thing to say you might think, but having been in teaching for nineteen years now I firmly believe that the mistakes and ‘fails’ we make are, as, if not more, important than the successes. We need to take every opportunity that comes our way, that challenges us to do something out of our comfort zones. If we make a mistake – then so be it. I know I have made many this year – such as pronouncing the names of children wrong or using fencing terminology incorrectly.

We encourage all the children at HCS to do the same – to adopt a growth mindset. We need to instil in them that they are capable of success in whatever they put their mind to, are passionate about and have the determination to achieve without being afraid of the potential mistakes and knockbacks they might experience along the way. We want children to view these errors as learning opportunities and not as failures.

Imagine if JK Rowling had given up on her Harry Potter series when she was rejected by seventeen publishers before the books were accepted. Or if Lionel Messi decided football was not his sport when at 11 he was told he was too small and would not make it as a footballer.

A great quote from Michael Jordan probably the best basketball player of all time: “I’ve failed over and over and over again in my life and that is why I succeed”.

And this is why at HCS we don’t only celebrate the successes, we celebrate participation and effort. We celebrate kindness and friendship. We celebrate community and we celebrate attitude and integrity.

Looking to the future we will continue to respect tradition but we will also strive to ensure our children are prepared for the challenges of the 21st century. We need to be open to innovation and improvement and I strongly feel that there is no better way to do this than to ensure our children and staff develop a ‘growth mindset’.

LET'S NOT FORGET THE FORGOTTEN ARMY

The 14th Army in Burma was known as the 'Forgotten Army' because all attention in the UK at the time was on the war in Europe following D-Day. No one should forget the awful struggle in the jungles and plains of Burma and there is one person who will surely not. Ron Harding, who is 102, was one of those great men who fought in Burma and is still very much alive living in Gloucester. He remarkably narrowly escaped death and capture several times. On one occasion, his position was overrun by the Japanese and he was forced to hide in a jungle hole for nigh on three weeks until he was rescued, suffering from dehydration and malnutrition.

THE ELEVENTH HOUR – A CONCERT OF REMEMBRANCE BY COLN CHOIR AND FRIENDS

Cirencester Parish Church 2nd November 2018 To mark the centenary of the Armistice at the end of the Great War, Coln Choir and friends will be performing a charity concert to commemorate the sacrifices made by soldiers from both sides in 1914-1918, and to celebrate the coming of peace after one of the most violent conflicts in history. Nearly 40 million people died in, and as a result of, the War, a conflict which altered the lives of millions more.

The concert will follow the story of the conflict from its beginnings in Sarajevo to the armistice at Compiegne, and the final peace in the Treaty of Versailles, through music and songs of the times, and music which reflects the courage and suffering of those who served and those who stayed behind. As well as Coln Choir, performers will include pianist Jonathan Phillips, singers Tani Phillips and Kate Hicks Beach, and trumpeter Peter Medland, and others.

The story will be told by David Mallinson, and there will be readings by Jackie Colburn and others from writers such as the war poets Wilfred Owen, Rupert Brooke and A E Houseman. The concert will also follow the stories of local men who went to war, many of whom never returned.

The concert will raise funds for the Royal British Legion and Cobalt Health. More details will be available later in the year, but for now [please keep the date in your diary.](#)


