

FROM THE VICAR

One of the attractive elements of Church of England worship (along with the wider Catholic church of which we are part) is the cycle of the “church’s year” – remembering the story of Jesus (and much else besides) year by year.

This month sees the start of ‘**Lent**’, a reflective season for Christians leading up to our annual remembrance of the momentous events of Holy Week & Easter. This year the South Cotswold Team of churches (to which our parishes belong) are holding weekly sessions on Tuesday evenings (see page 7), reflecting on God’s call to us – come and join us for one or more of these!

Often seen as a time of “giving things up”, Lent can be equally valuably used for the opposite – taking something up. What habits, of generosity of time or money, might we build into our daily living? Time for ourselves, in greater reflectiveness; or for others, keeping more in touch with lonely family members or neighbours?

The season begins on **Ash Wednesday** (March 6th). Two of our schools (Hatherop Primary & Hatherop Castle) are joining for a service in Hatherop church at 10.00 am, when we’ll symbolically mark some of the children’s foreheads with ash as we think about the need we all have to turn away from lifestyles that hurt ourselves, each other or the planet, and to live more as God intends. (There are other services across the Team, including at noon in Fairford and 7.30 pm in Lechlade.)

A welcome landmark in Lent is **Mothering Sunday** (31st). In the western half of CHEQS we’re holding a united service at 11.00 am in Hatherop church. There’s also a family service at Southrop on that day at 10.30 am. Mothers, families and others of all ages will be very welcome at both of these services.

LAUNCH OF QUENINGTON ARCHIVES - QUENINGTON VILLAGE HALL - SATURDAY 9TH MARCH

Over a number of years Lucy Abel-Smith and other members of the Quenington Society have been assiduously collecting information and photographs recording the history of Quenington. Last year these were all indexed and catalogued and have been relocated to the village hall office to form the Quenington Archives. Trevor Sallis, carpenter and local resident, has kindly made some attractive purpose-built shelving to store the archive boxes and folders.

The archives are available to consult by anyone who is interested in the history of the village. We plan to hold a small launch at the next Village Hall Coffee Morning on Saturday 9th March, from 10.30-12 noon. Lucy has kindly agreed to give a short introduction to them at 11 am and there will be a display of some of the items. Going forward, the office will be open to access the archives on a monthly basis during the regular coffee mornings and they will also be available at other times by pre-arrangement.

If you are interested, do come along and enjoy a trip down memory lane, along with a cup of coffee and home-made cake!

HATHEROP CASTLE SCHOOL

Imagine a school if you will. The entrance hall is buzzing with children gazing up at large screens like passengers in an airport lounge. On each screen is outlined a unique playlist of lessons that meet the specific learning needs and strengths of every individual pupil in the room. The children progress down the corridor to a large area divided loosely into four open plan teaching spaces.

Children who work well in groups are directed to the small round tabled collaborative class. Those who respond well to one on one consultations start the day with tutorial time with their teachers. Those whose learning is enhanced by technology are set to work on laptops while those who work best online may have no teacher at all and work under the guidance of a remote tutor. Children whose learning is not affected by group size attend seminars in larger lecture spaces while those who study independently and with success are allowed to proceed with very little supervision at all.

At the end of every lesson a short test is taken, a quiz by any other name, to assess the student's understanding of the topic. And the data is all fed into one master computer. Over time a picture of what works best for every pupil

develops, how successfully they learn and under what conditions. They also monitor what has and has not been learned, what topics must be revisited and at what speed each child should progress. Children all proceed at their own pace, no new learning objectives are attempted until the current ones have been achieved and staff support is always directed towards the areas of greatest need so that all children can reach their potential. Each day a new timetable is downloaded, each day staff are given time to prepare lessons to meet the next day's needs and each day children learn alongside different children, matched by learning need and ability rather than by age or by form group.

It sounds like the future, a thing of the imagination but this is 'School of One', a unit devised specifically for the teaching of maths in a Manhattan middle school in 2009. Now rebranded as 'Teach to one' the programme today has been adopted in 28 different schools educating 10,000 students across the US. The programme has received strong backing from innovators like Bill Gates and Mark Zuckerberg who see personalised learning as the future. It has also been heavily criticised and is highly controversial but, if nothing else, it is a brave and well-meaning experiment and it certainly gives us reason to think.

I am often saddened but not surprised by how many grown-ups reflect on their school days as a negative experience. In my school days there was no learning support, no differentiation and very little really creative teaching. You were stupid not dyslexic, naughty not ADD, clumsy not dyspraxic and weird if you were in any way original, quirky or individual. It was one size fits all. Except it didn't, and it couldn't. For those who weren't that shape, who didn't possess the selected measurable abilities, who didn't conform, it must have been, at times, a living hell.

But I am delighted to say that things have changed. What the best schools now do is focus on what children can do and not on what they can't. They aim to celebrate the broadest range of talents so that every child can experience success and discover their passions and what makes them tick. Above all perhaps they aim to build tolerant communities where difference is not just accepted it is actively encouraged and, wherever possible, celebrated. At Hatherop we do all we can to rise to these challenges and prepare our uniquely individual and wonderful children for the world they have joined.

They have given their all in football matches and cross country events. The next fixture is a netball tournament and the netball club run by Mrs Frogley has been very popular at lunchtimes.

Our topic in the Juniors this term is “Who first lived in Britain?” and we will be finding out about the Stone and Iron Ages. We are all excited about the upcoming trip to Stone Henge and have been undertaking D&T challenges to understand theories of how this monument could have been created with the limited technology available. In the Infants the topic is Jamaica, which offers a great opportunity for exploring music, art and food alongside improving our geographical knowledge.
