Southrop C of E Primary School has seen a lot of changes this term. Not only were there eight reception starters, but there were also six new members of staff. In addition, Mrs McLellan and Miss Davies have started their co-headship of the school. The first day started with cake making in worship, all the special ingredients that go in to make a fantastic school were mixed together by the Year 6s and the cake was eaten at lunch time to celebrate the start of the school year.

The whole school are focusing on this message: “ But what if I fall?” “Oh, but what if you fly!”

The children have been set the challenge to take risks with their learning, to learn from mistakes and explore things they do not know or understand yet. When they do this there is a chance for them to earn their wings. Well done Charlie and Ry - you are the first to get yours!

We have already enjoyed a number of trips to enrich our learning. The Infants are learning about Britain, and went on a trip to Cogges Farm in Witney. They started off as Anglo Saxons, where they learnt to grind flour, then travelled through time to the Victorian era, where they made beds, did the laundry and baked Welsh cakes.

The Juniors are learning about rivers and have been to Coleshill to explore the features of a river that runs through the National Trust parkland. They were delighted to catch crayfish, a baby brown trout, shrimps and mayfly larvae. There was also the opportunity to see the water mill running.

The Infants and Juniors joined together for a trip to the Cheltenham Literature Festival. Not only did they hear the authors Anthony Horowitz, Pamela Butchart and Matt Carr give talks, but many of them also got to meet the authors and have their books signed. HATHEROP CASTLE SCHOOL

One of the greatest joys during the school holidays is to be able to read those books that have been piling up on the bookshelf. To immerse yourself in another world, another time, another life is one of life's great pleasures. However, this holiday it was not a work of fiction that grabbed my attention but a book written by Professor Daniel Willingham called "Why don't children like school?"

Professor Willingham is a cognitive scientist and professor of psychology at the University of Virginia who researches how the brain works, in particular how children learn. One of the key messages I took from this book was that "memory is the residue of thought." Encouraging children to think, to be challenged, to be curious and to engage in their learning is vital if pupils are going to remember and learn and this is something which we focusing on this year at Hatherop.

In the Pre-Prep staff have been developing a new creative curriculum which, whilst retaining a focus on the key skills of Maths and English, adopts a more topic based approach to learning. The links between science, history and geography have been made clearer by teaching topics such as Explorers. By creating a broad, encompassing and creative curriculum we are encouraging pupils to expand their knowledge, ask as well as answer questions, apply what they know to different situations and contexts and, most importantly, think about what they are learning.

In the Prep school, pupils are being encouraged to review and apply existing knowledge, to clarify and verbalise their thinking whilst teachers are using questions to really develop thinking and problem solving skills. As Daniel Willingham also says, thinking should be hard work and here at Hatherop we want pupils to enjoy working and thinking hard. The development of our Hatherop Individualised Learning Time (HILT) is also providing lots of opportunity for pupils to be challenged and supported in their thinking and learning.

Developments over the summer have not just been limited to classroom practice. Work on an all-weather astroturf in the walled garden has started and pupils, parents and staff can't wait to get on it after half term. The boarding house has undergone a dramatic transformation with improved accommodation and facilities, and a refurbished science lab and a new pre-prep classroom are all evidence of the tremendous amount of work undertaken by the site team over the summer months. It was also our pleasure to host the Arcadian theatre company this summer in the school grounds with their production of Twelfth Night.

At the time of writing we have just come to the end of our first week and it is a real pleasure to see the whole community returning to school with enthusiasm and excitement. We are all looking forward to a fun, challenging and engaging term ahead.

'SAFEGUARDING' – IMPORTANT FOR THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND; IMPORTANT FOR US ALL

The Church of England is one of the churches in the UK that's rightly been taken to task about serious safeguarding failings in the past. In this diocese we can now all be confident that these matters are taken very seriously indeed and that not only are all in positions of responsibility being trained, but also that they are being supported by highly competent, specialist practitioners.

As part of my training to equip me better to lead services in our churches I've had to spend half a day attending a 'safeguarding' briefing.

When I learnt that attendance was mandatory my first thought was, "Why?" After all, I never work alone with children – in fact I scarcely engage with children at all in my present role. But having attended a session I now more fully understand the vital importance of 'safeguarding' and making sure all of those involved in any position of responsibility in our churches attend. It's not just clergy and service leaders; PCC members, pastoral visitors and bell-tower captains and deputies are all expected to attend.

Safeguarding is not just about protecting children; it's about looking after the interests of all those who attend or come into contact with our churches in any way. Those interests may be those of people who are vulnerable through old-age, through mental or physical disability, through domestic violence, through verbal or physical bullying or various other issues. Safeguarding training is about raising awareness, understanding the importance of confidentiality and knowing where to turn when one becomes aware of a possible issue. We are fortunate in the Gloucester Diocese not only to have those with specific safeguarding responsibilities in our area, but also to have highly experienced, knowledgeable and capable people heading-up the safeguarding team at diocesan level. It's a reassurance to know that they are there 24/7 to offer help and advice to those in leadership roles in our churches.
